





INTERESTED IN CAMP THIS SUMMER?



We at Jacksonville Community United Methodist Church support our youth and children in attending summer camp through the Upper New York Conference Camps. This includes Casowasco, the camp most frequently attended. We currently offer two possibilities for financial assistance.

The Alec C. Proskine Fund, will reimburse each camper \$200.00 regardless of how many weeks the camper attends camp each summer. These funds are available to attend any camp in the Upper New York Conference. The expectation is that families will pay the cost of camp initially. After camp, each child must write a hand written thank you note to Mr. Proskine. Thank you notes are collected and mailed, with a cover letter, to Mr. Proskine by the church camping coordinator (currently Amy Moe). A check is then mailed to the church, deposited, and the appropriate funds distributed to the family after the camp experience. The camping coordinator will keep a list of camp attendees, parent names and addresses, and when received, a copy of the thank you notes.

In addition, Jacksonville Church may be able to help with camping costs. Each year, by June 1, families will need to let the camping coordinator know of planned camp attendance. The mission committee will decide whether funds are available and determine the amount to be given. Priority will be given to children and youth who have been actively involved with our church during the previous year.

Children and youth who attend camp with Proskine fund and Jacksonville Church support will be expected to share a bit about camp experiences with the congregation in the fall.

Sock Project Update



Now that the Snow Birds are returning again, it seems appropriate to turn this activity back over to the Mission Committee. Before doing that, however, I wanted to let you know that we have delivered 2,252 pairs of socks since last fall.

Although most of them went to the Samaritan Center of Catholic Charities in Ithaca, we also delivered socks to the Rescue Mission in Ithaca, as well as to the Interlaken Reformed Church.

In every case, they were warmly received, and it was heartwarming to hear the words of appreciation. So, thanks to all who contributed. You made someone's day a little happier, and that's a wonderful gift to give. I'm certain that the Mission Committee will welcome contributions of socks throughout the year, so please keep that in mind.

EASTER THOUGHTS

On Sunday, April 9, we celebrate the joy of Palm Sunday when Jesus is welcomed into Jerusalem with waving palm branches and shouts of “Hosanna!” And then comes Maundy Thursday, when at Communion, we are invited to the Last Supper with Jesus and his disciples. During the following 24 hours, Jesus will pray alone in Gethsemane while his disciples sleep, will be tried for heresy; hung on a cross and tortured, crucified, die and be buried. During these events, NO ONE spoke up. In public his friends and disciples even denied knowing him. I ask myself how often have I remained silent and not spoken up for what I know in my heart is right.

In three days the Easter dawn revealed the miracle that Christ had risen. And the disciples were transformed. How many times do I deny God’s teachings through Christ and dwell in the darkness? God’s grace reminds me that in spite of Good Friday where death and darkness prevail there is an Easter coming filled with light, love and a time of new beginnings. One of my favorite sayings was written by Sister Corita Kent. Many years ago, she wrote, “All the rules will be fair and there will be wonderful surprises.” My prayer this Easter is that in our hearts we may know those fair rules and have the faith to live out wonderful surprises.
